"A very-common practice in eating such fruit as cherries is to swallow the stones, with the vague notion that these promote digestion. No error can be more fatally absurd. Many cases have occurred where such practices have been the cause of death, and that of a very exernicating nature. One instance, the property of the cause was found to be several large balls found in the intestines, accumulated around clusters of cherry-stones. The backs of gooseberies are often swallowed with the idea that they prevent any bad effects from the fruit.
