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who escaped from the State Prison in Hartford, in August or September last, on Monday evening, and fled to the street, by two men who had followed him from the country. One of them went up behind and seized him in his arms the other from him, and they both fled. He was put into a carriage and lodged in the Leverett street jail.

James G. Burnett, Esq. was appointed a delegate to attend the anniversary of the American Anti-Slavery Society, in May, in New York. The proceedings of the convention are to be published by the American Anti-Slavery Society. The object of the expedition is upon the foundation principle of IMMEDIATE—EMANCIPATION.
