The Rhode-Island Controversy.

The last number of the Christian Investigator, edited by William Goodell, in a stout pamphlet occupying 120 octavo pages, and is wholly devoted to a discussion of 'The Rights and the Wrongs of Rhode-Island,' in connexion with the recent troubles in that State. We have not yet found time to give it a careful perusal; but from a cursory examination of its contents, as well as from our knowledge of the ability of Mr. Goodell, we have no doubt that he has done emplejustice to the subject. And the severest remark on this situations conduct—indeed, the only one of censure that we have discovered in the pamphete—in, 'They did wrong in not shaping their own otherwise excellent Constitution, as it should have been, in their own Convention.' This pamphet cannot fill to command attention, and a wide circulation—
